# FHS Culinary Program is a Road to Success

This year, four students have embarked on a road to success through the Culinary Arts Program at Flagstaff High School lead by their extraordinary teacher Patti Pastor. Since the beginning of the school year seniors Delainey Rowland, Alejandro “Alex” Orelas, Courtney Smithson and Fiona Nicholson have practiced two to three times a week in order to be ready for their competitions.

The first competition was the National Restaurant Association Educational Foundation’s statewide ProStart Competition. The beginning of the competition consisted of Chicken Fabrication during which team members broke down a chicken in 15 minutes and then two team members chosen at random performed four knife skills that the judges choose. During the main competition the students were required to present a three course meal in one hour using only two butane burners and no motorized tools. As this competition was a qualifier for teams to go to the national competition, the students’ meal was to represent their state. The FHS team chose to represent the 5 c’s of Arizona: cattle, copper, coffee, citrus, and cotton through their menu that included Roasted Pepper and Mushroom Soup, Prime Arizona Tenderloin over Southwestern Bean, Corn and Sweet Potato Cakes accompanied by an Arugula, Red Onion and Baby Heirloom Tomato Salad topped with a

Citrus Pearl Vinaigrette. For dessert they prepared a Trio of Mousse, which included, Coffee, Lemon and Spiced Chocolate Mousse in a Tulle Cookie garnished with a Cotton Candy Sugar and Pomegranate Reduction Sauce. The Culinary students would like to acknowledge the teamwork with the FHS Welding class that provided the custom cookie pan for the competition.

This effort lead to a first place award. They also represented Flagstaff High School and the State of Arizona in April at the National ProStart Invitational in Anaheim. FUSD will post the results of this competition as soon as we have them.

While preparing for the national competition the individual team members competed in the Careers through Culinary Arts Program Competition (CCAP) and they shined. So far this year Fiona Nicolson has received a \$93,000 scholarship to the International Culinary AI (any campus in the country) and will not be competing in the national competition so she can finish her track season. The rest of the team, now

dubbed “Triple Threat”, has received the following awards from CCAP; Courtney Smithson has received \$4,500 to attend Scottsdale Community College and a paid externship to the Westin Kierland, Delainey Rowland will attend UNLV and has received a \$5,000 award and Alex Ornelas will attend NAU and has received a \$1,000 award.

All four team members hope to continue their studies in the culinary or hospitality field. Both ProStart and CCAP offer scholarships to culinary schools for the students who do well in the competitions.

Teacher Patti Pastor and the culinary team would like to thank Sprouts, Babbitt Ranches, Olive Garden and the Arizona Restaurant Association and numerous others in Flagstaff for their generous support of this wonderful program and amazing students.

## Two FUSD Schools Received Grants from SCA

SCA awarded 15 grants in the United States this year and two FUSD schools were fortunate to be among the recipients.

Summit High School was awarded \$4,140 to build a greenhouse. This funding will also cover the cost of other essential supplies for the greenhouse, i.e, shelving, pots. The Gardening class is planning to construct the greenhouse, and the gardening and nutrition classes will be utilizing curricula regarding healthy diet and the environmental impact of sustainable gardening. The food derived from the greenhouse will be donated to local food banks to aid with community efforts to provide healthy food items to individuals and families in need.

Cromer Elementary School received a \$5,000 grant that will be used to build a greenhouse and water table as well as expand their current gardening and composting program. This will allow students to visually study ecosystems, plant structure, and the live cycle of a plant in a hands-on way during the school year when plant growth is not a possibility outside. This will also create new opportunities for students to study the impact of the water movement in action from precipitation to evaporation to runoff and erosion. Cromer students will be able to make observations, do experiments, collect data and analyze that data to better understand our environment.

## Flagstaff High School Washington D.C./NYC Trip

February 27<sup>th</sup> through March 1<sup>st</sup> 50 FHS students, teacher Randy Hopson, Administrator Jeannine Brandel and Principal Tony Cullen experienced the "trip of a lifetime" according to students and adults. The trip began in New York City with visits to Times Square, a Broadway Show, the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, the Empire State Building, the 911 Memorial and a walking tour of Wall Street. The next three days were spent in Washington DC. In addition to visits to museums and memorials the students were treated to tours of the Supreme Court, the Library of Congress, a Capital Tour hosted by Congresswoman Ann Kirkpatrick's office, lunch in the Senate Dining Room, and tours of Mount Vernon and Alexandria, Virginia. One highlight of this trip is always the laying of a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in honor of all Flagstaff residents who have given their lives for our country.
