
WHY A SEED LIBRARY?

When you participate in the seed library, you create a culture of sharing and abundance.

TIPS FOR GERMINATING YOUR SEEDS INSIDE

Get the timing right!

The goal with germinating seeds is to have the seedlings ready to plant as soon as the weather is favorable. Make sure to check for planting times in one of our gardening books or online!

Place the seeds in a "soil-less" medium Store bought "soil-less" mixes or damp paper towels work well. This will ensure that soil pH will not effect proper germination.

Place seeds in an airtight container and close the container.

This will ensure that the seeds continuously receive the appropriate amount of moisture

Now, find a warm, well-lit place to put your seeds Which is another one of the factors that affect seed germination.

Once your seeds have germinated, you will need to plant them in potting soil. The seedlings will need lots of light! They will need at least 6 hours of natural light (or florescent lights for at least 14 hours). If not, the seedlings will be spindly. Continue growing them indoors so that they are protected until they are large enough to be moved outside.
